This year for the first time BASO will be holding its annual Scientific Conference alongside the NCRI congress. The NCRI congress brings together clinicians and basic scientists from all disciplines working in the field of cancer research to produce a first class congress with some of the best UK and global experts presenting ground breaking research. Historically surgical engagement with this congress has been poor, partly due to a clash with our own congress and it therefore seemed logical to link up. Surgeons will benefit by exposure to a much wider diversity of research about cancer, networking and methodological breadth and the NCRI will benefit from surgical input into their congress. Bearing in mind that the majority of cancers are treated surgically and over half are cured completely by surgery, the quality of cancer surgery is of paramount importance in multidisciplinary cancer care. We have worked to develop a hybrid conference with 2 full BASO days (Sunday and Monday) and ensuring a surgical track throughout the whole 4 day congress. We have retained all of the key features of a BASO conference but we hope our members will engage with the broader congress offering and stay for the whole 4 days.

We hope that by developing this collaboration we will help to support and foster increased surgical research activity. We are especially keen to encourage young surgeons to get involved and have a Trainees Day focussed on surgical research covering higher degrees, research collaborative and research funding.

Meet our Guest Speakers



Professor James Garden
Professor of Clinical Surgery

James Garden is Regius Professor of Clinical Surgery, Director of Surgical Distance Learning and Dean International at the University of Edinburgh. He is Chairman of the BJS Society and Editor-in-Chief of HPB. He is a Past President of AUGIS and the IHPBA.

As an academic hepatobiliary surgeon, he has led a strong clinical research group in Edinburgh over some 25 years.

He led the development of the University's highly successful surgical distance learning masters programmes which have recruited over 1000 students since 2007. The programme secured the Queen's Anniversary Prize for Higher and Further Education for the University in 2014.

He is an honorary member or fellow of a number of organisations including the surgical Colleges of England and Ireland as well as Australasia, Canada, America and Hong Kong. He was appointed Surgeon to the Queen in Scotland in 2004 and was made Commander of the British Empire in 2014.



Mr Brendan Moran
Consultant Surgeon

Brendan Moran is Consultant Surgeon in Basingstoke since 1995. His special interests include rectal cancer and peritoneal malignancy. He set up and established the peritoneal malignancy programme in

Basingstoke and with his four colleagues runs the largest appendix tumour centre in the world.

He has been involved in treating rectal cancer and is the Lead Clinician for the National Cancer Action Team Low Rectal Cancer Development Programme (LOREC) since 2010. He was Lead Surgeon in the Mercury Study and is the Principal Investigator in the ongoing Pelican Low Rectal Cancer Study which is the follow up study to the Mercury MRI study. He is President in waiting of the ACPGBI.



Mr Dick Rainsbury
Consultant Surgeon

Dick Rainsbury was Breast Tutor at The Royal College of Surgeons (1996-2001), College Director of Education (2003-2008) and ABS President (2011-2013). He is a strong advocate of comprehensive breast and reconstructive services in the NHS.

His interests include changing the configuration of breast surgery, developing new oncoplastic services, and

increasing recruitment into breast surgery. As founder chairman of the BASO-BAPRAS Interface Group in 2001, he secured DoH funding for a national Oncoplastic Fellowship training scheme. This has appointed over 110 fellows from a background of general and plastic surgery. More than 60 are now consultants in the UK or overseas.

He has delivered over 120 national and 100 international presentations on reconstructive, training and educational topics, and is senior author of some 50 papers and 13 book chapters. He chaired the recent UK National Mastectomy and Breast Reconstruction Audit, and edited the latest UK National Guidelines for Oncoplastic Breast Reconstruction.

Dr Yip is currently a consultant breast surgeon in Ramsay Sime Darby Healthcare in Malaysia, and Clinical Professor of Surgery at Tunku Abdul Rahman University, Kuala Lumpur. In September 2012, she retired as Professor of Surgery in the University of Malaya but continues as visiting consultant to their Department of Surgery.

Dr Yip is currently the President of Breast Surgery International. She has been Past-President of the Association of University Surgeons of Asia (2003-2005) Asia Pacific Organization of Cancer Control 2010-2012, and College of Surgeons of Malaysia (2010-2013). She has been appointed as a member of expert panels on breast cancer and cancer control, particularly in low and middle-income countries by the WHO, IAEA, Breast Health Global Initiative and International Consortium for Health Outcomes Measurement.

She was awarded the UICC 2009 Reach to Recovery International Health Professional Award. In Oct 2013, she was awarded the FACS (Hon) from the American College of Surgeons.



Professor Robert J Grimer
*Consultant Orthopaedic
Surgeon*

He qualified from the Middlesex Hospital Medical School in 1976 and worked for Rodney Sweetnam, who at the time treated the bone tumours. In those days amputation was the standard treatment and after six months and many amputations RJG thought that he'd had enough of bone tumours. He proceeded to pass his FRCS and was then appointed to the Orthopaedic Training Scheme in Birmingham and came to work for Rodney Sneath in 1980.

In four years the whole management of bone tumours had changed with the advent of chemotherapy and limb salvage surgery.

RJG was hooked and has spent his subsequent career managing patients with bone and soft tissue sarcomas. At a very early stage he created a database of the patients treated and their outcomes and this now has details of over 8000 patients with sarcomas, one of the largest databases in the world for this.

He founded the British Orthopaedic Oncology Society (BOOS) in 1990 and the multidisciplinary British Sarcoma Group in 1999 and is the past President of the European Musculo Skeletal Oncology Society (EMSOS).

His main surgical interests have focussed on pelvic tumours and surgery for sarcomas in children. His main aim has always been to improve outcomes for patients with Sarcomas.
