Professor Derek Alderson

*President of The Royal College of Surgeons of England
Emeritus Professor of Surgery, University of Birmingham*

President of the Royal College of Surgeons of England and an Emeritus Professor of Surgery at the University of Birmingham. An Editor in Chief of BJS open, Prof Alderson is an expert in oesophago-gastric cancer surgery and has particularly led the College's work on research, data collection and surgical outcomes.



Professor Jane Blazeby

Professor of Surgery, University of Bristol

Professor of Surgery at the University of Bristol and an Honorary Consultant Surgeon at University Hospitals Bristol NHS Foundation Trust. Jane leads research and supports trials in surgery which are relevant to patients, surgeons and the NHS; she has a long standing interest in measurement of outcomes from the perspective of the patient as well as the health professional.



Professor Freddie Hamdy

Nuffield Professor of Surgery, University of Oxford

Prof Hamdy is Nuffield Professor of Surgery, Professor of Urology and Head of the Nuffield Department of Surgical Sciences at the University of Oxford as well as Honorary Consultant Urological Surgeon at the Oxford Radcliffe Hospitals and Fellow of Balliol College. In 2010, he was also appointed Director of the Division of Surgery and Oncology and the Oxford Radcliffe Hospitals Trust. Prior to his move to Oxford in 2008, he spent 10 years as founding Chair of Urology and Director of the Division of Clinical Sciences, then Head of Oncology at the University of Sheffield. He qualified from the University of Alexandria, Egypt in 1981, and trained in Surgery and Urology at Liverpool, Sheffield and Newcastle.

Prof Hamdy's research activities encompass clinical, translational and basic science programmes on the biology of prostate and bladder cancer, with specific interests in the molecular mechanisms of disease progression, cancer induced bone disease, and cancer epigenetics. He is passionate about providing high-level evidence from clinical research for the management of prostate cancer.



Professor Henry Kuerer

Professor of Surgery with Tenure, PH and Fay Etta Robinson Distinguished Professor in Cancer Research, Breast Surgical Oncology, The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center, Houston, TX

Prof Kuerer plays an integral role in MD Anderson's world-renowned breast care group as a recognized cancer surgeon and researcher who specializes in the multidisciplinary care of patients with breast cancer. Recruited back to MD Anderson to help establish a premier program to train breast cancer surgeons of the future, he is now a tenured Professor of Surgery, the Director of the Breast Surgical Oncology Training Program, and a member of the Clinical Cancer Prevention Program.

He maintains a busy clinical research program and is also a Co-Principal Investigator for the newly expanded national cooperative group NRC Oncology (formerly National Surgical Adjuvant Breast and Bowel Project, Radiation Therapy Oncology Group, and Gynecologic Oncology Group) at MD Anderson, is on the editorial board of several clinical journals, and is an active member on several committees with the American Society of Breast Surgeons and the Society of Surgical Oncology.

Miss Karen Nugent

Past President ACPGBl; Consultant Colorectal Surgeon, Southampton University Hospital

A Senior lecturer in surgery based at the Southampton University NHS trust, Miss Nugent is the past President of the ACPGBl and the past President of the Colorectal Section of the RSM. She is a colorectal surgeon with an interest in pelvic floor disorders and anal cancer. She works as an Honorary Consultant at Southampton General Hospital where she runs a tertiary referral service for constipation and incontinence.

She has a major interest in education, having run the 3rd and final year undergraduate teaching programmes for the medical school and now as Head of School of Surgery for Wessex manages the quality of 10 surgical postgraduate programmes.

Currently she is the President of the Pelvic, Obstetric and Gynaecology Physiotherapists and her present roles also include Director Education for the Association of Surgeons, International representative for the ASCGBI and is the council member of the European Society of Coloproctology.

Professor Anna Martling

Professor of Surgery, Karolinska University Hospital, Sweden

A senior Colorectal Surgeon and Professor of Surgery at Karolinska Institutet, Sweden, Prof Martling defended her thesis on rectal cancer in 2003 and became a board certified surgeon in 2004 and an Associate Professor of Surgery in 2009. Since 2008 she has been research group leader and is responsible for the research field of colorectal surgery with a special focus on clinical and epidemiological studies on colorectal cancer. Her special interest has been radiotherapy, timing of surgery and development of surgical techniques. In 2013 Anna Martling was awarded the Swedish Society of Surgery Major Research Prize. Martling has published more than 75 peer-reviewed articles and is a frequent lecturer in Sweden and abroad.



Professor Arnie Purushotham

Professor of Breast Cancer, King's College London

Professor Purushotham has been a Consultant Surgeon and Clinical Academic for 22 years having worked in Glasgow, Cambridge and London. The Director of King's Health Partners Comprehensive Cancer Centre and is also a Senior Clinical Advisor to Cancer Research UK. As a scientific researcher for the last 25 years, Professor Purushotham's aim is to drive high quality clinical and translational research that directly impacts on breast cancer patients.

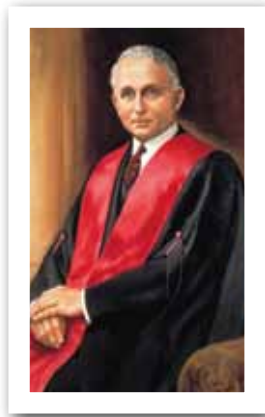

BASO Raven Travelling Fellowship was endowed in 1993 by the Ronald Raven Trustees in memory of Ronald Raven, Founder of the Association.

The award is currently for a maximum of £2,000 and may be awarded to one or several individuals as considered appropriate by the BASO~ACS National Committee when considering the merits of their applications.

The scholarship is open to UK-resident trainees or recently appointed consultants, who have gained the fellowship of one of the British or Irish Colleges, and who intend to travel outside the UK. Applicants need not be members of BASO~ACS or BASO Trainees Group (although this is desirable) but applications must relate to the aims and objectives of the Association.

Applications are now invited for the BASO~ the Association for Cancer Surgery project grant, awarded to assist surgeons to undertake research projects related to surgical or surgically linked cancer care.



BASO ~ ACS is an NIHR non-commercial Partner. Research studies funded through our 'Project Grant' award scheme are eligible for consideration for NIHR Clinical Research Network support and inclusion in the Central Portfolio Management System (CPMS). The NIHR Clinical Research Network supports researchers and the life sciences industry in developing, setting up and delivering high quality research to time and target in the NHS in England.

Applications are sought for discrete projects such as projects seeking funding for the initial development of clinical trials, studies aimed at initial data collection to inform the design of a future trial or systematic reviews. Subject to satisfactory applications, one to three awards up to the total value of £6,000 will be made. Normally the award will be for one academic year.
